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
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SAN SALVADOR – THE DYNAMIC CAPITAL


JUAYUA – FOOD FESTIVALS AND SCENIC HIKES


LA UNIÓN – GATEWAY TO THE GULF

JOYA DE CEREN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE

Dubbed The "Pompeii Of The Americas," Joya De Cerén Is A UNESCO World Heritage Site And One Of The Most Important Archaeological Discoveries In Central America. This Preserved Pre-Hispanic Village Was Buried Under Volcanic Ash From An Eruption Around AD 600, Perfectly Capturing The Daily Life Of The Indigenous Pipil People. Visitors Can Walk Along Elevated Paths To View Ancient Homes, Storage Buildings, And Communal Spaces, Gaining Rare Insight Into The Region's Past. Interpretive Signs And A Small Museum Enrich The Experience, Making It A Must-See For History Buffs.

LAKE COATEPEQUE

Set Within A Volcanic Caldera, Lake Coatepeque Is A Shimmering Turquoise Lake Surrounded By Lush Hills And Luxury Villas. TAZUMAL RUINS

CONCHAGUA VOLCANO




HIKE A VOLCANO


